

Not the start to the season we wanted with the 1959 bonnet catch (TR3A) breaking the week before the event.....but at least we had the Abarth as an alternative and unlike the TR250 which had collapsed at the start (ball joint broke at 5mph on arrivalbetter than at 70mph a few minutes earlier!) we were able to participate in the run. Paul Richardson and Phil Titchner were on the event in Paul's TR3A.

The start was at Rougham Airfield near Bury St.Edmundswhich was home to the USAAF 94th Bomber Group between 1943 and 1945. After a bacon sandwich and a quick look around the museum (I loved the American Jeep pedal car) we set off through the King's Forest and passed the Anglo Saxon village at West Stoweand continuing on through many pretty Suffolk villages such as Lidgate. Lovely to see daffodils, tulips and cowslips all along the route, in the sunshine; although we were devastated to drive along one road where at least 30 mature trees had been chopped down with no obvious evidence of disease!!

Our coffee and cake stop was at The Fox Inn at Ousden, then we were onwards into Cambridgeshire via Balsham, Hildersham (the beautiful ford had been coned off as too deep for vehicle passage), Shepreth, Barrington and then passing Wimpole Hall. It was then a straight run to Biggleswade apart from going through Potton Brook ford, which stands alongside a 13th Century packhorse bridge. Chris took the ford at some speed with great sprays of water being thrown upmuch to the alarm of the photographer. I thought that he got an absolute soaking but Chris says the photo evidence doesn't really show thisstill think I'm married to a hooligan.


I am not sure why the route took us through Biggleswade as going via Langford and Broom would



have been more scenic but one interesting fact is that Ian Mantle lived here. He was a notable rally driver who drove a Berkeley sports car (manufactured in Biggleswade). He took part in the Netherlands Tulip Rallythe event on which today's "tulip" diagrams originated. At the start we had 3 very small letter boards to find on route and 2 checkpoints to visit. Along with many, we didn't find board number 2, so it must have been well hidden.

We left Biggleswade to arrive at Shuttleworth via Jordan's Mill with plenty of time to have lunch with Paul and Philand a look around the museum.

Well; 2023 showed us that the best attended DiD's are when we organise a visit to a Steam Train museum. Together with this year, our last DiD to get so many cars out, was our Trip to Bressingham Steam & Gardens in 2019. Where can we go next year?

The best efforts of HS2 (not TS2) closing roads around the venue, couldn't stop us and the organisation and route planned by Graham Teeson were excellent. Where else can you get a great day out, with premier parking within the attraction, all for a donation of £6 a car? Many of us had not been to the museum before and even if you paid the full admission fee of £15pp it would be excellent value to see all the exhibits across the 25 acre site.



We enjoyed walking around the museum and also a full size train ride up and down the short length of track left after Dr Beeching's review of British Rail in the 1960's. Being a specific Festival weekend, there was also a full programme of model train activities on a narrow gauge railway and even smaller. The Steampunk Morris Dancers enjoyed a ride as you can see in the associated photo.

There were a few retail opportunities to spend money and you can read elsewhere in TRunnion about Tony Bannard Smith's TR2 purchase. The second hand book stall had many titles to drool over, but most resisted, so I am afraid you won't see them in the LVG book swap at Broom.

Given a wash, the cars pink paint gleams. Meccano Ltd's Dinky cars are a much truer copy of the originals than Corgi Toys have achieved with their TR2. (Covered in an earlier TRunnion). Their body mould lines are very accurate. The box shows the TR2 in light blue/red on one side and in pink/light blue on the other. Interesting coupling of colours. Maybe I need to find some very small '29' roundels for the doors and bonnet! I wonder how many 111 models were made? It's worthy to note this car has a lady driver under those white overalls. A bargain £12 addition to my TR sidescreen collection.

Last month I recounted the tale of our venerable Skoda, which developed a nasty habit of losing gears, eventually ending up with just 3rd and 4th. A few days later, I prepared to take the car to our local VW specialist in WGC for an initial inspection, to find that all gears were present and correct – weird. Using the car just for local trips meanwhile, a couple of weeks later it went in for a full check – and this is where I demonstrate my ability to "talk technical" – a connecting pivot in the gear linkage tower had become discombobulated and/or knackered (or something like that). Anyway, the result was just a modest bill for cleaning and lubricating the gizmo, rather than for a new gearbox, which was most welcome - so the Skoda will continue to trundle around when the TR or campervan are not in use. Apparently some spares for 15-year-old Skodas are no longer available from VW – is this a business opportunity for Moss or Rimmers – specialists in Triumph, MG, and Skoda? – perhaps not.

Now back to TR topics. My 4A has been somewhat poorly over the winter – slow to get out of bed in the morning, sneezing and coughing, generally out of sorts (the car as well). Fortunately a couple of sessions with "Doctor" Pete Major before the season got underway restored the 4A to full health. The neighbours are very grateful, now that they don't have to listen to protracted attempts to splutter into life, followed by the inevitable poppings and bangings (I am talking about the car now). It does help to have a choke which functions correctly when trying to start up.

Drive It Day on April 23^{rrd} featured the LVG trip to the Buckingham Railway Centre, for a combination of classic cars and steam trains – just my cup of tea (well, coffee actually) - unfortunately, I had to give this outing a miss due to other commitments on the day.

A few days later it was off to Dorset for the CACCC Springing Up Tour. Recent experiences of the M25 car park have persuaded me to find alternative routes more amenable to a classic car - this time we went across country on A & B roads via Hemel, Wendover, Benson, Newbury, Andover, Salisbury, and Blandford, to Wareham. A slightly longer and possibly slower route compared to the M25 / M3 / A303 option (depending upon M25 traffic jams), and this should have been a more relaxing and enjoyable run. However, stalling the car in Salisbury at the head of an uphill traffic light queue, and having to push it out of the way, was a trifle embarrassing (although the car restarted almost immediately) - the rest of the journey to Wareham in heavy rain was not very enjoyable.

We had stayed at our hotel at Stoborough near Wareham previously for the 2018 SU Tour, and we re-visited also the pub just down the road for our first night rendezvous. After the damp drive down to Dorset the previous day, the weather for the tour itself on April 28th was dry, so hood down. The first section featured a run along the Jurassic Coast road (B3157) with some superb views (even from a TR), to a stop at West Bay near Bridport. A couple of incidents here provided some light relief – firstly, no sooner had one of our group parked his smart MGA at the beach car park, then a seagull dived down and with Stuka-like accuracy, decorated the bonnet with several "bombs" – MGA driver then seen filling a bucket and performing an in-transit car wash. Then another one of our number beached his immaculate Austin A30 in the loose sand, requiring several of us to push the car out.

The second section then went north towards Sherborne Castle, stopping on the way for refreshments at the White Hart pub in Yetminster, a most welcoming hostelry, especially for classic cars. The last section of the day then headed south again, passing down the Piddle Valley (no comments please), before driving through picturesque Milton Abbass and back to our hotel. The post-tour dinner at the hotel was excellent, and inevitably the "Wally of the Day" trophy went to our friend in the A30.

A good start to the touring season, and my 4A ran reliably all weekend.

TR activity is well under way this year, and on the horizon now is the LVG 50th Anniversary Drive on May 28th. Our Group Leader and Events Organiser between them may have shown a certain lack of judgement here, by allowing a person who mutters to design the route (or actually to resurrect a route from a few years ago) – however Phil and Mike will be carrying out the pre-tour route survey, so any mistakes encountered on the day clearly will be "nothing to do with me" (a phrase which apparently I employ frequently). Anyway let's hope that the British weather is in a co-operative mood, and it will be hoods down for the day – see you at the start at Baldock Services.

May is going to be a busy month, as we will be off to the West Country in the VW campervan for a week. Shortly after returning from this trip, it will be time to do the route survey for the CACCC Tibbles Tour which takes place on June 25th. This is the traditional one-day tour, which has been running for 30

-plus years, and always finishes at the club "HQ" at the Carpenters Arms pub in Harpenden. Not surprisingly it becomes difficult to find new routes and venues, so again this year's route is really from a previous tour, but run in reverse (no, not the cars) – but don't tell anyone, they may not notice.

Now for some thoughts on the current situation (chaos?) in Formula 1. First we had the shambles at the Australian G.P. (three race stoppages under red flags, two of them with just three laps to go). Then we had a very near miss at the Azerbaijan race, when officials allowed some photographers and press into the pit lane while the race was still under way. However, just to show the current mentality surrounding F1, recently an item appeared in the press – Felipe Massa (the retired Ferrari F1 driver) was considering mounting a legal challenge to have the result of an F1 championship overturned (to his benefit and Hamilton's loss). This challenge refers to some alleged race-fixing (not involving Hamilton) in the Singapore G.P – but this was in 2008, 15 years ago!! I really have to go into Basil Fawlty mode now – I MEAN, WHAT IS THE BL**DY POINT???

Contrast this with the actions of British driver Peter Collins (see pic) in the 1956 Italian G.P. – leading the race and with the chance to be World Champion, he spotted team leader Fangio in the pits and out of the race. Without any instructions from the Ferrari team, Collins came in and voluntarily handed his car over to Fangio, who went on to finish 2^{nd} in the race and win his 4^{th} championship that year (at the time drivers could share cars and still score points). I cannot recall any 50's F1 driver resorting to legal tactics to overturn a result - just shows how attitudes and approach have changed over the years – thanks to the efforts of Mr. Ecclestone & co., F1 is not really a sport anymore.



I have to finish this month with some sad news - Stuart McRoberts, former LVG committee member and Treasurer, passed away in hospital on April 21^{st} after a short illness. Stuart, along with Rod Hill (also ex-LVG), was largely responsible for getting me involved with classic cars, and the three of us shared the ownership of a TR6 ("Lulu") for a couple of years before I acquired my 4A – we all joined LVG in 1992. Stuart was involved with LVG in the 1990's and early 2000's, before moving to Suffolk, so will be known primarily to some of our older members. You'll be missed, mate – R.I.P. Stuart.




A local engineering company have kindly heloed with a good welding job on the assembly ...which should last for some time. I have kept the new one on order!
